
SILENCED BELLS-DISTANT VOICES St Cuthbert's Church Norham 6th-14th November 10am-4pm

St Cuthbert's Church in Norham will be the setting for an extraordinary remembrance themed installation of art and music between 6 and 14 November. A sculpted artwork, Distant Voices, by Keith Roberts will be on display alongside a recording of *Memorial* by John Casken, a choral work he wrote for Coquetdale Chamber Choir in 2014.

Keith Roberts' broken and fractured life-size church bells represent the chaos and

destruction of war. The bells have no tongues; they are silenced and have no voices. These are not bells that will ring out in celebration, but nine fragile and damaged bells which nevertheless speak to us of loss -and simultaneously ask us to consider what it is to be silenced.

Memorial is a choral work about twelve men from Upper Coquetdale who were lost during the First World War and who lie with no graves. Their names, ages and villages



where they lived form part of John Casken's own text for the music, his memorial for the fallen and lost. The recorded work will be played every hour on the hour Monday to Saturday from 10am until 3pm, and by candlelight at 4pm. On Sunday 9th November, Remembrance Sunday, it will be played from 12 noon, and every hour until 4pm thereafter.

Gina McCormack is one of Britain's leading artists, with regular performances as a soloist and chamber musician at venues across the country and abroad. Gina has performed at the Wigmore Hall, and as soloist with the Hallé, Royal Philharmonic and Scottish Chamber Orchestras. She was the leader of the Sorrel Quartet for many years, and, more recently, spent two years as first violinist of the Brodsky Quartet. She is currently teaching at the Royal Northern College of Music, Manchester.

Armenian pianist Marianna Abrahamyan is an internationally recognised award-winning pianist and collaborative artist. In June 2024, she was awarded the degree of Doctor of Performing Arts by the University of St Andrews, and, in addition to her performing activities, she is a piano lecturer at the Royal Conservatoire of Scotland.

The St Cuthbert's Project aims to improve the heating, lighting, seating and heritage interpretation at Norham Church, in order to make the church building more user-friendly and more useful to the wider community. This concert will be the first to benefit from the stage curtain behind the chancel arch, which should reduce draughts and improve heating in the church, and is due to be installed as part of the St Cuthbert's Project.
